Health and safety information

Always comply with the following precautions and usage tips to avoid dangerous situations and ensure peak performance of your camera.

Note-notes, usage tips, or additional information



Do not use your camera near flammable or explosive gases and liquids

Do not use your camera near fuels, combustibles, or flammable chemicals. Do not store or carry flammable liquids, gases, or explosive materials in the same compartment as the camera or its accessories.

Keep your camera away from small children and pets

Keep your camera and all accessories out of the reach of small children and animals. Small parts may cause choking or serious injury if swallowed. Moving parts and accessories may present physical dangers as well.

Prevent damage to subjects' eyesight

Do not use the flash in close proximity (closer than 1 m/3 ft) to people or animals. Using the flash too close to your subject's eyes can cause temporary or permanent damage.

Handle and dispose of batteries and chargers with care

- Use only Samsung-approved batteries and chargers. Incompatible batteries and chargers can cause serious injuries or damage to your camera.
- Never dispose of batteries in a fire. Follow all local regulations when disposing of used batteries.
- Never place batteries or cameras on or in heating devices, such as microwave ovens, stoves, or radiators. Batteries may explode when overheated.

Avoid interference with pacemakers

Maintain a minimum of 15 cm (6 inches) between cameras and pacemakers to avoid potential interference, as recommended by manufacturers and the independent research group, Wireless Technology Research. If you have any reason to suspect that your camera is interfering with a pacemaker or other medical device, turn off the camera immediately and contact the manufacturer of the pacemaker or medical device for guidance.



Handle and store your camera carefully and sensibly

- Do not allow your camera to get wet—liquids can cause serious damage. Do not handle your camera with wet hands. Water damage to your camera can void your manufacturer's warranty.
- Do not expose the camera to direct sunlight or high temperatures for an extended period of time. Prolonged exposure to sunlight or extreme temperatures can cause permanent damage to your camera's internal components.
- Avoid using or storing your camera in dusty, dirty, humid, or poorly-ventilated areas to prevent damage to moving parts and internal components.
- Remove the batteries from your camera when storing it for an extended period of time. Installed batteries may leak or corrode over time and cause serious damage to your camera.
- Protect your camera from sand and dirt when using it on beaches or in other similar areas.
- Protect your camera from impact, rough handling, and excessive vibration to avoid serious damage.
- Exercise caution when connecting cables or adapters and installing batteries and memory cards. Forcing the connectors, improperly connecting cables, or improperly installing batteries and memory cards can damage ports, connectors, and accessories.
- Do not insert foreign objects into any of your camera's compartments, slots, or access points. Damage due to improper use may not be covered by your warranty.

Protect batteries, chargers, and memory cards from damage

- Avoid exposing batteries or memory cards to very cold or very hot temperatures (below 0° C/32° F or above 40° C/104° F).
 Extreme temperatures can reduce the charging capacity of your batteries and can cause memory cards to malfunction.
- Prevent batteries from making contact with metal objects, as this can create a connection between the + and – terminals of your battery and lead to temporary or permanent battery damage.
- Prevent memory cards from making contact with liquids, dirt, or foreign substances. If dirty, wipe the memory card clean with a soft cloth before inserting in your camera.
- Do not allow liquids, dirt, or foreign substances to come in contact with the memory card slot. Doing so may cause the camera to malfunction.
- Turn off the camera when inserting or removing the memory card.
- Do not bend, drop, or subject memory cards to heavy impact or pressure.
- Do not use memory cards that have been formatted by other cameras or by a computer. Reformat the memory card with your camera.
- Never use a damaged charger, battery, or memory card.

Use only Samsung-approved accessories

Using incompatible accessories may damage your camera, cause injury, or void your warranty.

Protect your camera's lens

- Do not expose the lens to direct sunlight, as this may discolor the image sensor or cause it to malfunction.
- Protect your lens from fingerprints and scratches. Clean your lens with a soft, clean, debris-free lens cloth.

Exercise caution when using the camera in humid environments

When transferring the camera from a cold environment to a warm and humid one, condensation can form on the delicate electronic circuitry and memory card. In this situation, wait for at least 1 hour until all moisture has evaporated before using the camera.

Check that the camera is operating properly before use

The manufacturer takes no responsibility for any loss of files or damage that may result from camera malfunction or improper use.

Important usage information

Allow only qualified personnel to service your camera

Do not allow unqualified personnel to service the camera or attempt to service the camera yourself. Any damage that results from unqualified service is not covered by your warranty.

Ensure maximum battery and charger life

- Overcharging batteries may shorten battery life. After charging is finished, disconnect the cable from your camera.
- Over time, unused batteries will discharge and must be recharged before use.
- Disconnect chargers from power sources when not in use.
- Use batteries only for their intended purpose.

Expressions used in this manual

Pressing the shutter

- Half-press [Shutter]: press the shutter halfway down
- Press [Shutter]: press the shutter all the way down



Subject, background, and composition

- Subject: the main object of a scene, such as a person, animal, or still life
- Background: the objects around the subject
- Composition: the combination of a subject and background



Exposure (Brightness)

The amount of light that enters your camera determines the exposure. You can alter the exposure with shutter speed, aperture value, and ISO speed. By altering the exposure, your photos will be darker or lighter.

Common questions

You can get answers to common questions. Solve problems easily by setting shooting options.

The subject's eyes appear red.	 This is caused by a reflection from the camera flash. Set the flash option to Red-eye or Red-eye Fix. (p. 43-44) If the photo has already been taken, select Red-eye Fix in the edit menu. (p. 73)
Photos have dust spots.	Dust particles floating in the air may be captured in photos when using the flash.Turn off the flash or avoid taking photos in a dusty place.Set ISO speed options. (p. 45)
Photos are blurred.	 This may be caused by taking photos in low light conditions or holding the camera incorrectly. Use the Course (p. 29) Press [Shutter] halfway down to make sure the subject is focused. (p. 25)
Photos are blurred when shooting at night.	As the camera tries to let in more light, the shutter speed slows. This can make it difficult to steady the camera and may result in camera shake. • Turn on the flash. (p. 43-44) • Select * Night in the SCN mode. (p. 31) • Set ISO speed options. (p. 45) • Use a tripod to prevent your camera from shaking.
Subjects come out too dark because of backlighting.	 When the light source is behind the subject or when there is a high contrast between the light and dark areas, the subject may come out shaded. Avoid shooting in front of the sun. Select [№] Backlight in the SCN mode. (p. 31) Set the flash option to F Fill in. (p. 44) Set the Auto Contrast Balance (ACB) option. (p. 55) Adjust the exposure. (p. 55) Set the metering option to Spot if a bright subject is in the center of the frame. (p. 56)

Charging the battery and turning your camera on

Charging the battery

Before using the camera for the first time, you must charge the battery. Attach the USB cable to the AC adapter and then plug the end of cable with the indicator light into your camera.



• Green: Fully charged

Turning on your camera

Press [POWER] to turn your camera on or off.

• The initial setup screen appears when you turn on the camera for the first time. (p. 18)



Turning on your camera in Playback mode

Press []]. The camera turns on and accesses Playback mode immediately.



Press and hold []] to mute camera sounds.

Performing the initial setup

The initial setup screen appears to allow you to configure the camera's basic settings.

- 1 Press [POWER].
 - The initial setup screen appears when you turn on the camera for the first time.
- 2 Press $[\mathfrak{G}]$ to select Language and press $[\mathfrak{G}]$ or $[\mathbf{OK}]$.



- 3 Press [DISP] or [] to select a language and press [OK].
- 4 Press [DISP] or [♥] to select Time Zone and press [♥] or [0K].
- 5 Press [4] or [3] to select a time zone and press [0K].
 - To set the daylight-saving time, press [DISP].



- 6 Press [DISP] or [*] to select Date & Time and press [*] or [0K].
- 7 Press [4] or [3] to select an item.



8 Press [DISP] or [S] to set the date and time or select a date format, and press [OK].



You can also access shooting options by pressing $\left[F_{II} \right]$ but some options are not available.

- 1 In Shooting mode, press [MENU].
- 2 Press the navigation button to select to an option or menu.
 - Press [DISP] or [*] to move up or down; press [4] or [*] to move left or right.



Press [MENU] again to go back to the previous menu.



Press [Shutter] to return to Shooting mode.




3 Press [**OK**] to confirm the highlighted option or menu.

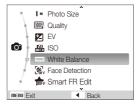




Setting the display and sound

Changing the display type

Select a style of display for Shooting or Playback mode.

Press [DISP] repeatedly to change a display type.

About a histogram

A histogram is a graph that displays how light is distributed in your photo. If the histogram has a high peak on the left, your photos are dark. A peak on the right of the graph means that your photos are bright. The height of the peaks is related to color information. The more of a particular color, the taller the peak.

Setting the sound

Set whether your camera emits a specified sound when you operate your camera.

1 In Shooting or Playback mode, press [MENU].

2 Select **Sound** \rightarrow **Beep Sound** \rightarrow an option.

Option	Description
Off	The camera does not emit any sounds.
1/2/3	The camera emits sounds.

3 Press [MENU] to return to the previous mode.


1 Rotate the mode dial to Cs.




You can shoot close-up photos by adjusting the zoom. Your camera has a 15X optical zoom and 5X digital zoom. By using both, you can zoom in up to 75 times.

Rotate $[\mbox{Zoom}]$ right to zoom in on your subject. Rotate $[\mbox{Zoom}]$ left to zoom out.



Digital zoom

If the zoom indicator is in the digital range, your camera is using the digital zoom. The picture quality may deteriorate when you use the digital zoom.



SCN (*), 2, 2, 2, 4, 4, 9), and 省 modes and when used with Face Detection.

- It may take longer to save a photo when using the digital zoom.
- The zoom sound may be recorded if you use the zoom while recording a video.

The zoom ratio available for videos differs.

Reducing camera shake (OIS)

Reduce camera shake optically in Shooting mode.

- OIS may not function properly when:
 - you move your camera to follow a moving subject
 - you use digital zoom

- there is too much camera shake
- the shutter speed is slow (e.g., when you select Night in the SCN mode)
- the battery is low
- you take a close-up shot
- If you use the OIS function with a tripod, your images may be blurred by the vibration of the OIS sensor. Deactivate the OIS function when you use a tripod.
- If the camera is impacted, the display will be blurry. In this case, turn
 off the camera and turn it on again to use the OIS function correctly.

Make sure nothing is blocking the lens.

Preventing your subject from being out of focus


It may be difficult to get your subject in focus when:

- there is little contrast between the subject and background (When your subject is wearing a color of clothing that is similar to the background)
- the light source behind the subject is too bright
- the subject is shiny
- the subject includes horizontal patterns, such as blinds
- the subject is not positioned in the center of the frame



Use the focus lock

Half-press [Shutter] to focus. When the subject is in focus, you can reposition the frame to change the composition. When you are ready, press [Shutter] to take your photo.







Using the Aperture Priority, Shutter Priority, or Manual mode

Adjust aperture value or shutter speed to control the exposure of your photos. You can use these options in the Aperture Priority, Shutter Priority, and Manual modes.

Aperture value

The aperture is a hole through which light is admitted. You can adjust the aperture value to control how much light reaches the lens when you capture a photo. By decreasing the aperture value (opening the aperture wider), more light will enter and objects that are farther away will appear out of focus. This is good for closeup or portrait shots to draw attention to the main subject.

Alternatively, as you increase the aperture value, objects from near to far are in sharp focus. This is good for landscape shots to show the entire scope of the scene.



Big aperture value



Small aperture value

Shutter speed

Shutter speed controls how long the camera's shutter remains open when you capture a photo. When you decrease the shutter speed, more light enters your camera and the photo will appear brighter. However, a slower shutter speed can also result in blurry photos if either the subject or the camera is moving.

When you increase the shutter speed, the photo will appear darker. However, a faster shutter speed will also reduce the blurring if your subject or the camera is in motion.







Using the Aperture Priority mode

The Aperture Priority mode allows you to manually set the aperture value while the camera automatically selects an appropriate shutter speed.

- 1 Rotate the mode dial to **A·S·M**.

- 4 Select Shooting → Aperture and then adjust the aperture value.
 - See page 33 for more information about the aperture value.





Recording a video

Record videos of up to 20 minutes in length in high definition. The recorded video is saved as an H.264 (MPEG-4.AVC) file.

- H.264 (MPEG-4 part10/AVC) is a high-compression video format established by international standard organizations ISO/IEC and ITU-T.
 - Some memory cards may not support high definition recording. In this case, set a lower resolution. (p. 40)
 - When the Optical Image Stabilization (🌸) is activated, your video may be recorded with the OIS operation sound.
 - The zoom sound may be recorded if you use the zoom while recording a video.

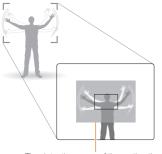

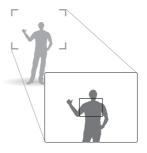



 - If there is reflected light or much dust in the air, tiny spots may appear on your photo.

Adjusting the amount of flash PASM

Adjust the amount of flash to avoid overexposure or underexposure.

- 2 Select Shooting \rightarrow Flash EVC.
- 3 Adjust the amount of flash.



- Adjusting the flash amount may not be effective if:
 - the subject is too close to the camera
 - you set a high ISO speed
 - the exposure value is too big or too small
 - In some shooting modes, you cannot use this function.

Adjusting the ISO speed PASM

The ISO speed is the measure of a film's sensitivity to light as defined by the International Organization for Standardization (ISO). The higher ISO speed you select, the more sensitive to light your camera becomes. With a higher ISO speed, you can get a better photo without using the flash.

1 In Shooting mode, press [MENU].

2 Select Shooting \rightarrow ISO \rightarrow an option.

- Select the subject and lighting.
- The higher ISO speed you select, the more image noise you may get.
 - When Motion Capture is set, ISO speed will be set to Auto.

Using macro EVIIO P A S M CUAL

Use macro to take close-up photos of subjects, such as flowers or insects. Refer to macro options in "Setting the focus distance."





Using face detection MINGUAL SCN

If you use face detection options, your camera can automatically detect a human face. When you focus on a human face, the camera adjusts the exposure automatically. Take photos quickly and easily by using **Blink Detection** to detect closed eyes or **Smile Shot** to capture a smilling face. You can also use **Smart Face Recognition** to register faces and prioritize the focus on them.

- In some scene modes, face detection is unavailable.
 - Face detection may not be effective when:
 - the subject is far from the camera (The focus frame will appear orange for **Smile Shot** and **Blink Detection**)
 - it is too bright or too dark
 - the subject is not facing the camera
 - the subject is wearing sunglasses or a mask
 - the subject is in backlighting or the lighting condition is unstable
 - the subject's facial expression changes remarkably
 - Face detection is not available when using a photo style, smart filter effect, or image adjustment option or when used with Tracking AF.
 - Face detection is not available when using the digital zoom.
 - When you use the face detection option, the digital zoom will not work.
 - Depending on the selected face detection option, the timer is not available or some timer options are not available.
 - Depending on the selected face detection option, some burst options are not available.
 - When you take photos of detected faces, they will be registered in the face list.
 - The options may differ depending on the shooting mode.
 - You can view registered faces in order of priority in Playback mode.
 (p. 65) Even though faces are registered successfully, they may not be classified in Playback mode.
 - The detected face in Shooting mode may not appear in the face list or Smart Album.

Detecting faces

Your camera automatically detects human faces (up to 10 human faces).



- 1 In Shooting mode, press [MENU].
- 2 Select Shooting \rightarrow Face Detection \rightarrow Normal.
 - The closest face appears in a white focus frame and the rest of the faces appear in grey focus frames.
 - The closer you are to the subject, the quicker your camera will detect faces.
 - When you use the burst option, the detected faces may not be recognized.

Taking a self-portrait shot

Take photos of yourself. The focus distance will be set to close-up and your camera will emit a beep.



- 1 In Shooting mode, press [MENU].
- 2 Select Shooting \rightarrow Face Detection \rightarrow Self-Portrait.
- 3 When your hear a quick beep, press [Shutter].

Taking a smile shot

The camera automatically releases the shutter when it detects a smilling face.

- 2 Select Shooting \rightarrow Face Detection \rightarrow Smile Shot.
 - When your subject smiles broadly, your camera can detect the smile more easily.

Detecting eye blinking

If your camera detects closed eyes, it will automatically take 2 photos in succession.



- 1 In Shooting mode, press [MENU].
- 2 Select Shooting \rightarrow Face Detection \rightarrow Blink Detection.
 - Hold your camera still while "Capturing" is displayed on the screen.
 - When blink detection fails, "Picture taken with eyes closed." message appears. Take another photo.

Using smart face recognition

The camera automatically registers faces that you frequently photograph (up to 10 people). This feature will automatically prioritize the focus on those faces and favorite faces. This feature is available only when you use a memory card.
